Clearly, this is a highly relevant issue for librarians as well as meteorologists and it is an opportunity for ASLI members to share their expertise with the meteorological community. Did you know that 2009 has been designated as the Year of Science? At the annual conference, Dr. Robert Tolliver gave a paper describing possible library activities related to the Year of Science.
